HOW TO CREATE A WORKS CITED PAGE

- This is where you will list all sources you cited in the text of your paper.
- Title your page: Works Cited
- Arrange your entries alphabetically, using the first word in the entry to guide you.
- In each entry, every line after the first is indented 5 spaces (tab key).
- Single space within each entry, but double space between them.
- Use easybib.com for help

Directions: EVERYTIME you include research in your paper, you must tell the reader where your information comes from. This information is listed on a WORKS CITED page. Using the examples below, draft your works cited entries. BE SURE TO INCLUDE ALL MARKS OF PUNCTUATION!

MLA WORKS CITED FORMATTING GUIDE

EBSCOHOST (MAGAZINE)

Author. "Title of Article." Title of Magazine Date: Page(s). Name of Database. EBSCOhost. Date of Access <<http://search.epnet.com/>>.

Example:

Heyman, J.D., and Johnny Dodd. "New Arm, Same Spirit." People 23 Feb. 2004: 58+. MasterFILE Premier. EBSCOhost. 8 May 2004 <<http://search.epnet.com/>>.

EBSCOHOST (JOURNAL)

Author. "Title of Article." Title of Journal Volume number (Year): Page(s). Name of Database. EBSCOhost. Date of Access <<http://search.epnet.com/>>.

Example:

Nelson, Roxanne. "Smoking Outside Still Causes Second-Hand Smoke Exposure to Children." Lancet 359 (2002): 1675. Academic Search Premier. EBSCOhost. 8 May 2004 <<http://search.epnet.com/>>.

WEBSITE

Author's name (if available). Name of Site. Date of Posting/Revision. Name of institution /organization affiliated with the site (sometimes found in copyright statements). Date you accessed the site.

Example:

Benson, David. Ankle Replacement Prosthetics. 16 Nov. 2007. University of Maryland. 6 Feb. 2008 <<http://www.anklereplacement.com>>.

Note: When you type this information, only include YOUR resources and alphabetize the entries. Do **not** number your entries!
